As one of the most common cancer diagnoses in the U.S., breast cancer knows no bounds – but it does affect people of diverse races differently. In 2022, the American Cancer Society reported that "Black women still have a 4% lower incidence rate of breast cancer than white women but a 40% higher breast cancer death rate." While there are varied reasons for this disparity, the study authors noted that improved screening and treatment were essential to changing this startling statistic.
